Group Dynamics

- Developing interpersonal relationships is crucial to the success of a chapter
- First step to doing so is making sure everyone knows their role as part of the team
 - Good communication is essential
 - What is expected of each individual?

Group Dynamics

- Beneficial to the whole team

What is Leadership?

- A learned behavior that can be improved by study and application
- Anyone can do it!
- O HOSA members have the best opportunities to become leaders
- Essential for school, community, and occupation
 - Leadership helps us prepare to take a place in society as a useful, productive, well-adjusted citizen



- Understands the principles of democracy
- Respects and trusts others
- Realizes that every person can make a contribution
- Understands himself/herself and has confidence
- Accepts responsibilities
- Is optimistic, open-minded, straightforward, and friendly
- Praises individuals when praise is due
- Is sensitive to basic trends and moods of the group





- Works for the group and realizes groups can solve problems
- Does not claim to have all the answers
- Supports the ideas of others if it is best for the group or situation
- Will take a stand and be counted
- Shows initiative in getting a group started
- Plans carefully to initiate action





- The best way to learn leadership is to experience it
- Steps to help develop leadership:
 - Study the qualities of recognized, good leaders.
 - Study oneself, identifying own weak and strong points
 - Develop oneself as a good follower and learn to obey as well as command.
 - Learn about groups in general

Remember leadership is a function, something to do, not merely a group of personality traits.
